



Possum


This Australian mum gives piggy-back rides.



1. With your pencil, lightly draw an oval and a circle with a small space between them.




2. Add an extra bulge to the oval and then draw a small oval overlapping the circle.



3. Sketch two ear shapes and circles for the eyes. Next, draw a small nose and a 'w' shape for the possum's mouth.

4. Draw a curved line from the head to connect with the circle as shown. Add guidelines for the branch.




5. Next, add guidelines for the front paws and the tail.

Taking a ride

6. Add detail to the eyes, ears and nose. Draw some claws so the possum can grip tightly to the branch.

Now you can complete your possum drawing with a felt-tip pen before erasing the pencil guidelines.

2. Add lines for arms and legs.


