Sometimes they describe something. *Example:* We found a key in the **wooden** box.

Sometimes when the suffix -en is added to a base word, the spelling of the base word changes. For example, hide becomes hidden. When a base word

ends in *e*, drop the *e* and add the suffix. For example, *take* becomes *taken*.
