





Clues

The first three words rhyme with 'bake', 'eight' and 'fair'. The sixth word means an enormous hunk of rock. The ninth and tenth words start with the same two letters. The seventh and eleventh words are contractions - one with 'is' and the other with 'have'. The last word rhymes with 'lot' and 'hot' and 'not' and 'shot' and 'Camelot' and 'Lancelot'.
