Founder of the American Red Cross

- Clara Barton was born in 1821. Her father was a good storyteller. He had an active mind. Clara loved to listen to the tales he told. She thought about her father's stories when she was supposed to be asleep.
- ² Clara lived with her father, mother, and siblings. They had a farm near Boston. She often played with her brothers and sisters. Her brother David taught her how to ride horses. Clara and David rode horses together.
- Clara loved to read and learn. At the age of fifteen, she became a teacher. She taught students in grade schools. Her students thought Clara was a good teacher. They forgot she was almost their age too!
- Later, Clara went away to college. While she was away her mother died. Soon after, Clara moved to Washington, D.C. She was the first woman to work in the U.S. patent office.
- ⁵ When the American Civil War began, Clara wanted to help. She asked people for supplies. Then she helped soldiers who were hurt. She was a good nurse.

- It seemed like Clara Barton never felt tired. She was always ready to help. One soldier saw Clara coming toward him. He thought she looked like an angel. The newspapers gave Clara a nickname. They called her "The Angel of the Battlefield."
- Being a war nurse was a dangerous job. Clara was almost shot several times. She knew her work was important. When soldiers were hurt or scared, she held their hands. When they were hungry, she fixed them food. She also brought heavy buckets of water to them.
- One time Clara was helping an injured soldier. She felt a breeze on her arm. She looked down and saw a hole. A bullet had passed through her shirt! She had been so busy she hadn't noticed.
- 9 Still, Clara Barton didn't give up. She worked from dawn until dark. She comforted the soldiers. She helped the doctors with their work.
- The war ended in 1865. Clara got letters from many people. They asked her to help them. They wanted to find lost soldiers. Clara Barton helped find many missing people.
- Long after the war had ended, Clara gave speeches about helping others during war. She told people how important it was to help others. Clara had begun her hardest work. She wanted to keep helping people. She wanted to do more than help soldiers during war.
- Clara continued her hard work. She shared her ideas. People listened. The American Red Cross was formed in 1881. Clara Barton was its leader.
- Clara Barton died in 1912. Her hard work paid off. The American Red Cross still helps people.


